The Philip Goodeve-Docker Memorial Prize

The Philip Goodeve-Docker Memorial Prize is awarded in memory of Philip Goodeve-Docker and is offered to the top performing student of the District Nursing programme in every university in England, Wales and Northern Ireland.

Philip, together with two colleagues, set out to cross the Greenland Ice Sheet in April 2013 as a challenge to raise funds for charity. Philip had chosen to fundraise for the QICN, in memory of his grandfather, Patrick Pirie-Gordon, who had been a Trustee and Treasurer of the charity for many years.

The team set out on 26 April, but became trapped in a sudden and very severe polar storm. Tragically, shortly before rescue could arrive on the morning of 28 April, Philip passed away. His two colleagues were airlifted to safety, but suffered severe frostbite during their ordeal. Philip’s friends and family raised funds in his memory and it is this fund that enables us to offer this prize in his name.

Philip was posthumously awarded the Queen’s Commendation for Bravery in January 2017 and a full Citation explaining in detail how he saved his teammates’ lives was published formally in the London Gazette.

QICN Fellows are known leaders within their sphere of expertise; usually primary care or community based services. They often have a previous or on-going connection with the QICN. And they are people with a high profile and the respect of their peers, who are willing to advocate on behalf of the QICN.

Thea Stein (online)

Thea Stein became Chief Executive of the Nuffield Trust in September 2023. She was previously Chief Executive of Leeds Community Healthcare NHS Trust, Carers Trust, Yorkshire Forward and North East Leeds Primary Care Trust. Beginning her career as a clinical psychologist in homelessness and addiction services, she brings deep insight into the wider determinants of health, including housing, environment and employment.

A compassionate and evidence-driven leader, Thea champions community healthcare and nursing, promoting integration and the vital role of local services. At the Nuffield Trust she has commissioned key work on the nursing workforce, especially district nursing, and is a national advocate for neighbourhood teams.

Professor Joanne Atkinson

Professor Joanne Atkinson is a leading academic in palliative and end-of-life care and a registered nurse for over 40 years. With a background in oncology and as a Macmillan Clinical Nurse Specialist, she has advanced education and research in community-based palliative care.

Joanne has contributed to national standards and curricula through NHS England and QICN, and advised the All-Party Parliamentary Group on Hospice and Palliative Care. Her research spans cancer, long-term conditions, and care homes. She co-founded My New Hair with the late Trevor Sorbie MBE, transforming it into an international charity supporting people with medical hair loss through education and advocacy.



Gill Boast

Gill Boast is a General Practice Nurse (GPN) Facilitator for Staffordshire Training Hub, supporting GPNs across East and South East Staffordshire, and serves as Primary Care Nurse Facilitator for East Staffordshire CCG.

A Queen’s Nurse since 2014, she has worked in general practice since 1998, previously serving as a school nurse, trauma ward sister, and A&E and surgical nurse. Gill has mentored student nurses, taught at Wolverhampton University, and contributed to national initiatives including the Cardiovascular Disease Systems Leaders Forum and the National Wound Care Strategy. She co-launched the Ellen Mary Memorial Prize for outstanding Specialist Practice GPN students.

Matthew Peel

Matthew Peel is a leading figure in custody healthcare, serving as a national advisor, expert witness, author, and Queen’s Nurse since 2022.

A clinical leader and role model, he oversees the induction, training, and supervision of custody healthcare professionals and has shaped key guidelines, policies, and patient group directions. He has extensive experience assessing individuals detained under the Police and Criminal Evidence Act and co-edited the first book for healthcare professionals in this field. A former NHS England Clinical Nurse Fellow, he contributed to the QICN standards on criminal justice nursing and serves on the UK Association of Forensic Nurses and Paramedics.

Professor Nicola Ranger

Professor Nicola Ranger is a nursing leader and Chief Executive and General Secretary of the Royal College of Nursing.

Formerly Chief Nurse at several NHS Trusts, she led King’s College Hospital through the COVID-19 pandemic, championing staff wellbeing and challenging unsafe practices such as corridor care. Since qualifying in 1989, she has worked across the UK and internationally, including in Pakistan during conflict, and in major US hospitals. With experience in intensive care, trauma and HIV/AIDS care, she has held senior roles at UCLH and Surrey and Sussex Healthcare. A passionate advocate for safe staffing and fair conditions, she promotes unity across the profession.



Rachel Viggars

Rachel Viggars is a leading advocate for General Practice Nursing and co-founded the GPN Foundation School with Gill Board to address workforce shortages.

As Strategic Nurse Lead at the Staffordshire Training Hub, she has developed innovative training pathways for nurses new to general practice, creating a nationally recognised model for education and professional development. A Queen’s Nurse with over 20 years’ experience as a General Practice Nurse and Advanced Nurse Practitioner in North Staffordshire, Rachel also serves as Associate Director of Nursing for the North Staffordshire GP Federation and continues to practise clinically in the extended access service.

Professor Olga Yakusheva

Professor Olga Yakusheva is an economist and Professor of Nursing at the Johns Hopkins School of Nursing, and Economics Editor for the International Journal of Nursing Studies.

With degrees in mathematics and economics and post-doctoral training at Yale, she is internationally recognised for her research on the economic value of nursing and its impact on health and organisational outcomes. An Honorary Fellow of the American Academy of Nursing, she advises the American Nurses Association and The Joint Commission. She co-directs the ANA’s “Framing and Articulating the Economic Value of Nursing” initiative and leads national research on optimising nursing care delivery.



The Dora Roylance Memorial Prize

Awardee:

Dora Roylance completed her Queen’s Nurse training in Lancashire in 1939 just as WW2 broke out. She wrote to us about her experiences of nursing during the war, of the many nights of planes passing over and dropping bombs. The nurses, tin hatted, going out to attend births even in the deep snow of 1941/42 and how the nurses got to all their patients – daily for 14 days after delivery. After the war, Dora decided to train as a Health Visitor and received a bursary to do this from the QICN. She continued to work as both a District Nurse and a Health Visitor, which she said was the best and happiest time of her life. Dora died aged 100 and left a legacy to the QICN to be used for the ‘training and inspiring of nurses to excel in their work’. The Dora Roylance Prize for Student Health Visitors recognises the most outstanding Health Visitor student at each university offering the programme in England, Wales and Northern Ireland.

The Ellen Mary Memorial Prize

The QICN announced the creation of a prize for student General Practice Nurses in 2019, named in memory of Ellen Mary, whose daughter is a Queen’s Nurse, a university lecturer and an Advanced Nurse Practitioner in General Practice. As a young woman Ellen Mary joined the St John Ambulance Service to learn first aid and home nursing. After WW2 Ellen volunteered as a Special Constable and during 21 years of service, became the first female Sergeant in her area. She was also well-known as a Parish Councillor and the President of the Women’s Institute for many years. The prize is offered for outstanding students who have completed the Specialist Practice Qualification (SPQ) General Practice Nurse programme.



The Dame Elizabeth Fradd Memorial Prize

The Dame Elizabeth Fradd Memorial Prize for Outstanding Achievement as a Community Children's Nurse Student was established in 2024. Professor Dame Elizabeth Fradd DBE, a Fellow of the QICN and a distinguished children's nurse, held various roles as a registered nurse, midwife, and health visitor. She later became Deputy Chief Nursing Officer for England and Director of Nursing at the Commission for Health Improvement. In 2009, she was awarded the DBE for her contributions to nursing and healthcare. A Fellow of multiple esteemed institutions, including the Royal College of Nursing and the Royal College of Paediatrics and Child Health, Dame Elizabeth's legacy is honoured by this annual prize for the most outstanding student in the Specialist Practice Qualification in Community Children's Nursing across universities in England, Wales, and Northern Ireland.

International Community Nurse of the Year Award

This the fifth year that the QICN has offered this Award to recognise Internationally Educated Nurses working in community settings in England. All Internationally Educated Nurses who have worked in any health or social care setting in the community in England for 1 to 5 years were eligible for nomination by their employers.
